Beekeeping!

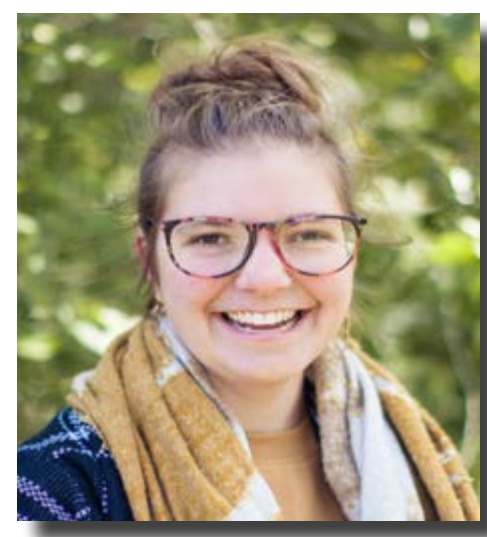
Students research and care for a real hive

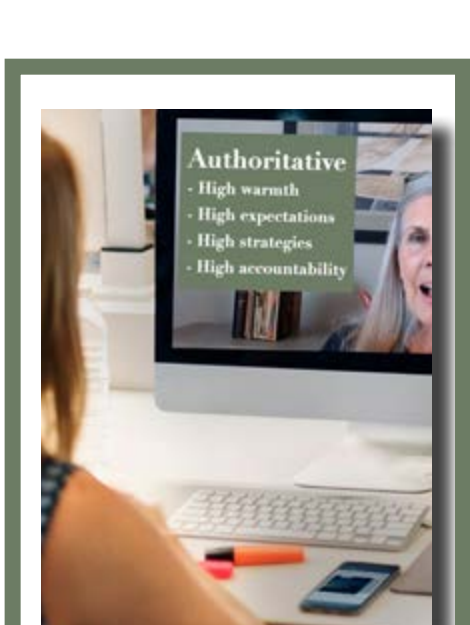
